Hope for Franklin Hill Families

Silvia Brewer has lived in the Franklin Hill Development in Dorchester for more than 29 years and has seen its deterioration firsthand.

"I thought the place needed to be redone when I came here in 1974, it has just gotten worse," said Brewer, the Vice Chair of the Franklin Hill Tenant Task Force.

Unfortunately, the buildings at Franklin Hill have come to the end of their useful life and require complete demolition and

reconstruction. The buildings and their systems are also compromised because the original design of the site does not lend itself well to improvements without total reconstruction.



Franklin Hill, like many of its housing counterparts built in the early 1950's, consists of nine, three-story barracks-style brick buildings.

This design is visually inconsistent with surrounding homes in the neighborhood, mostly late 19th and early-20th-century two- and threestory Victorians, clad primarily in wood and brick.

Furthermore, the site does not have a public street address and as many as 12 units share a common entrance to each building. This causes a sense of anonymity and isolates

residents of the monotonous development.

But if residents and the Boston Housing Authority get their wish, hope is on the way.

Charlestown Elects Task Force, Improvements in the Works

esidents at the Charlestown Development used their power to vote on June 12, 2003 to elect a new Tenant Task Force. President Tyrenzo Sumler comes into office with many thoughts on improvements that can be made throughout the Development and a vision for a more unified community.

The Task Force has already begun redefining its image. The group now refers to itself as "The Multicultural Tenant Task Force," a tribute to its diversity.

"We have members who are Spanish, Somalian and we have vacancies and are hoping others will join," explained Sumler.

The objective is to have a task force that is representative of the Development's racial and ethnic make-up. "We think a diverse group will be helpful in a huge way," said Sumler of the board that currently consists of Linda Guerrero, Edna Walrath, Abdulkadir Yusuf, Janet Nardone, Phyllis Senna, Miranda Bowman, Jose Renta and Margaret Doherty. "We want to be able to communicate with everybody."

"I think that a multicultural task force will have a great impact given the diverse group of residents we have here," added Charlestown Manger Kellie Dean. "They should serve the needs of every resident at the Development."

Charlestown has the distinction of being the largest and most diverse Development the BHA owns. A great number of Hispanics, African-Americans, Caucasians, American-Indians and Asians bring their unique culture to the site. Also, there are more than 11 different languages spoken at Development, increasing the need for an elective body that understands the concerns of all residents.

The Task Force has already begun interacting with tenants in an attempt to uncover their needs. "We've been going out and talking with the residents and getting feedback," said Sumler. "We've found that their main concerns are maintenance and security issues and we are working on solving them."

In fact, the Task Force has already set up a Security Subcommittee and a Maintenance will be undergoing several changes in Subcommittee that will report to the

Task Force with ideas and suggestions for improvements.

For safety purposes the Task Force is currently encouraging tenants to call an anonymous tip line (1-800-78-crime) they can report important information to without fear of reprisal. The ultimate goal is to set up a crime prevention hotline exclusively for Charlestown residents.

Manager Kellie Dean has also organized "Take Back Your Hallway" meetings in coordination with the Task Force in order to further secure the Development. As part of the plan, hallways are

being fixed to ensure that the door hardware and intercom systems lock and are fully functional. Also, a resident in each hall will be appointed to monitor his hallway and make sure that

everything is working properly.

Maintenance issues are also in the process of being resolved. "We are working together with the BHA to find solutions," said Sumler. He noted that they are already in the process of "getting out-standing work orders done."

In addition, the Task Force is planning events that will attempt to create a more unified atmosphere around Development and boost morale. Some ideas include a "Next Resident Idol" competition in which tenants of all ages will showcase their talents, a reward for children who receive good report cards and an athletic competition between Charlestown and other BHA developments.

One of the first events held by the Task Force, a holiday celebration on December 20, was well received by residents.

Approximately 100 tenants turned out for the party. Children had their pictures taken with Santa Claus and enjoyed pizza. The night concluded with a tree lighting ceremony.

Ultimately, the goal is to create a positive environment in which to raise children. "The majority of residents are concerned about their kids," explained Sumler. "They are worried about their future."

The positive changes wrought by the Task Force should do much to quell those fears.

The teams raise money by collaborating with their parents to hold fundraisers. They also garner generous donations from the community, which help defer the cost of uniforms, equipment and competition fees.

"What makes this program successful is the parents' and coaches' commitment to raising monies," said Patterson. "This year's goal is to raise enough money to attend the Universal Cheerleaders Association Cheer Camp at Mount Ida College."

The BHA recently submitted an application petitioning the Department of Housing and Urban

Development for a \$20 million HOPE VI grant to completely rebuild Franklin Hill, a project estimated to cost \$105 million.

Residents have embraced the initiative.

In a written statement, seventy members of the Frankilin Hill community signed off on the plan. The letter to HUD states, in part, "The Franklin Hill residents enthusiastically support the BHA's 2003 HOPE VI

application to [HUD]. BHA staff, working side-byside with us, kept us fully informed and involved throughout the application planning process."

The BHA has conducted several meetings

with tenants of Franklin Hill and is in constant contact with them in order to ensure both parties have a say in the process. More than 350 residents of the development have been involved in the planning at one point or another.

Brewer acknowledges that, "the cooperation between the BHA and the residents has been wonderful."

Many tenants worry that the HOPE VI

construction will decrease the number of affordable units in the development, as is often the case. However, the plan at Franklin Hill is to construct 378 housing units, all of which are affordable. Of the 378, there will be 69 units available for homeownership.

Current Franklin Hill residents, who qualify, will get preference for 56 of the homes.

"Residents are thrilled to have the option

of returning," said Brewer.

"Homeownership is a good opportunity for families."

Another component of the revitalization is the de-urbanization of the development. The cement found throughout the site will be replaced with benches and tables for outdoor seating, a community garden, a playground, attractive

landscaping and lighting, and space for community gatherings.

"I think the outskirts of the development will blend in nicely with the rest of the

neighborhood," explained Brewer.

In addition, the HOPE VI grant also sets money aside for community and supportive services for residents. These programs include case management services, job training sessions, education workshops and recreational programs.

It takes an immense amout of planning and

preparation to execute a HOPE VI plan and the BHA has already proven it is up to the task. The Authority currently operates three HOPE VI grants in Mission Main, Orchard Gardens and Maverick Gardens. (Continued on page 5)

At Mission Main, all 535 units have been developed and occupancy is 100%. Orchard Gardens has already constructed 422 units and Maverick Gardens, the most recent HOPE IV recipient, is on schedule.

With such a track record of developing HOPE VI projects, the BHA welcomes the opportunity of cultivating a new beginning for Franklin Hill families.

BHA Administrator Sandra Henriquez explains, "At Franklin Hill, we have the unique opportunity to change radically the development, giving residents the chance to come into their own, however they define it for themselves. Our mission is to provide residents with a safe environment with high quality housing, where they don't have to worry about crime or if their roof is leaking, and can get on with their business and think about their goals for themselves – going back to school, getting a better job. This is why we are in this business – to provide residents with the opportunity to become everything they can be."

HUD is expected to make a decision whether to accept or reject the BHA's request by spring.
